AO1(AW) Thomas R. Currie earned the title of **Naval Air Force**, **U.S. Pacific Fleet Sailor of 1996**.

The *Blue Diamonds* of VFA-146 won the **1996 COMNAVAIRLANT Boola Boola Award**, which recognizes excellence in air-to-air missile loading and employment.

The Naval Aviation Museum Foundation presented two prestigious awards during a banquet on 9 May. The **1997 R. G. Smith Award for Excellence in Naval Aviation Art** was given to James J. Dietz, an internationally renowned artist whose works can be seen in the National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C. and the San Diego Air and Space Museum in California. The **1997 Adm. Arthur W. Radford Award for Excellence in Naval Aviation History and Literature** went to John B. Lundstrom, who is the assistant curator of history at the Milwaukee Public Museum in Wisconsin and author of several books devoted to Naval Aviation.

On 12 April, **Cdr. Bill Gortney**, CO of VFA-106, bagged his 1,000th carrier trap, aboard *John C. Stennis* (CVN 74) while flying an F/A-18C *Hornet*.

On 5 May, HC-4 skipper **Cdr. Chris Real** passed 5,000 career flight hours.

Rescues

Personnel from **HC-5** were safely rescued following the crash of a CH-46 Sea Knight from the replenishment ship USNS Niagara Falls (TAFS 3) on 19 April. The crash occurred approximately 2,000 miles southwest of Hawaii during vertical replenishment operations with Constellation (CV 64). The four HC-5 crew members, home-ported in Guam, were rescued by the quick reaction of other CH-46 helicopters on scene at the time of the incident. Assisting in the rescue was a motor whale boat from Niagara Falls, also home-ported in Guam. The survivors, all of whom escaped injury, were transported to Constellation for medical observation and released.

A helicopter rescue crew from the NAS Whidbey Island, Wash., Search and Rescue (SAR) unit per-



formed an emergency medical evacuation from the stern of Carnival Cruise Lines' cruise ship Tropical on 13 May. A 54-year-old woman passenger suffered a stroke while aboard Tropical and was treated by the ship's medical staff. When her condition worsened, the captain of the luxury ship notified CGS Port Angeles, Wash., and requested a medevac. While in flight, however, the Coast Guard helicopter suffered a mechanical malfunction, requiring the crew to turn back. NAS Whidbey Island's SAR team was then notified and launched soon after. Because the emergency required a doctor, pilot Lt. Henry Velarde first flew to CGS Port Angeles to pick up Coast Guard Cdr. David Canton, M.D., then flew out to intercept Tropical 20 nautical miles off the coast of Washington. Once on scene, the UH-3H Sea King crew lowered HMC Michael Johnson and HM2 Michael Reigler to the deck of Tropical. They prepared the patient for transport, then hoisted her and a companion back to the helo and transported them to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. The other members of the Sea King crew included copilot Lt. Peter Davi and crew chief ATC(AW/NAC) Mark Harvey.

While conducting routine operations in the western Atlantic on 5 June, Sailors from Norfolk, Va.based John C. Stennis (CVN 74) rescued three Canadian crew members from a capsized boat. The survivors, two men and a woman, were aboard their 33-foot motor sailer *The Gull* when it lost its mast in a storm. *Stennis* was about 80 miles away when communicators at NAS Oceana, Va., notified the ship that a distress signal had been received. As the carrier turned towards the signal's location, a Coast Guard *Falcon*

An HH-60 *Seahawk* from HS-5 transported the rescue team from *Stennis* to the victims, where OT3 Kevin Baker was lowered into the storm-whipped seas and helped the survivors into the helo's hoist. The trio was taken aboard *Stennis* and treated for shock and hypothermia.

The **NAS Lemoore, Calif., SAR** team was called out on 24 April to rescue a 13-year-old male who had fallen and suffered head injuries while hiking in Yosemite National Park. Ten minutes after receiving the call, the crew—Lts. Steve Ostrander and Ron Segerstrom, AMH2 Mike Roberts, AD2 Jason Holmes and HM3 Keith Koerber was airborne and heading for the park, where they arrived within an hour. Park rangers had placed the victim in a litter and prepared him for transport. They had also moved him to the middle of a bridge near a heavily wooded area to make him more accessible to the rescue helo. The crew positioned the helo over the bridge where Koerber was low-

Gray Owl Title Passed

On 9 May, during the 1997 Naval Aviation Symposium in Pensacola, Fla., the prestigious title of Gray Owl was passed from retiring RAdm. Jon Coleman to VAdm. Herbert Browne, Commander Third Fleet.

The award traces its origins to 1978, when Naval Aviator Capt. Kenn Haas decided that there should be an award for the Naval Flight Officer (NFO) community that equaled the Gray Eagle Trophy, which honors the Naval Aviator with the

earliest designation date. Capt. Haas asked Grumman Aerospace Corporation to sponsor the award, the proposal was accepted and the first formal presentation of the Gray Owl trophy was held in June 1979. The name of each recipient and the date the title was assumed are engraved on the trophy.

The Gray Owl trophy goes to the active duty NFO who has held that designation for the longest period of commissioned service. When the incumbent retires, the award is passed to the next earliest designated NFO on active duty. To date, there have been eight Gray Owls:

Upon arrival, the corpsman assessed the patient, then they were both hoisted back up to the waiting helo. Ostrander piloted the helo to nearby Ahwanee Meadow, where an awaiting medevac helicopter transported the victim to a hospital in Fresno, Calif.

Scan Pattern

Quick action by two sailors from VAQ-141 averted a potential accident on the flight deck of John F. Kennedy (CV 67) on 11 March. AME2 Timothy Taber and AMEAN Marc Andrews were notified by an aircrewman that their EA-6B *Prowler* had an apparent liquid oxygen (LOX) gauge malfunction. Andrews and Taber inspected the LOX system and discovered that one of the nonventing bottles was swelling and frosting over. Knowing that such symptoms meant that the bottle would soon explode, Taber quickly directed Andrews to call a crash cart crew to help dispose of the bottle. While the crew was on the way, Taber pulled the LOX bottle out of the aircraft and dropped it into an emergency bomb disposal chute on the ship's starboard side. For his actions, Taber was awarded the Navy–Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

JOCS Russell D. Egnor, USNR (**Ret.**), who worked for 11 years as Director of the Navy Office of Information (CHINFO) News Photo Division, died 17 June in Falls Church, Va., at the age of 60. Mr. Egnor, who had accumulated over 34 years of active and reserve naval service since he enlisted in 1954, played an integral part in the recent transition of the Navy's photo program into the era of digital imagery. This capability has allowed wide and near-instantaneous photo coverage of Navy operations throughout the world.

Capt. Quentin C. Crommelin, USN (Ret.), the last surviving member of a family of WW II combat veterans, died of cancer 28 April in Montgomery, Ala. He was 78. He and his four brothers served in the Navy during the war. In 1981, the frigate *Crommelin* was christened in their honor. Capt. Crommelin, a 1941 graduate of the Naval Academy, saw combat duty at Guadacanal in the Pacific during WW II, and was CO of *Enterprise* (CV 6).

One of the most decorated Naval Aviators in WW II history died 15 June at the age of 82. **Capt. Elbert S. McCuskey, USN (Ret.),** who earned his aviator wings in 1939, was credited with shooting down 14 Japanese aircraft during the Battle of Midway. In addition, he fought in the Battle of Coral Sea and the liberation of the Philippines.

Sailors from the *Independence* (CV 62) Battle Group and four Royal Australian Navy ships changed places while the two groups operated together between 21 and 28 May. Training during the cross-deck sessions focused on integrated battle group exercises in a number of tactical scenarios and individual skill exercises in communications, signaling and shiphandling.
