## Teamwork: Men and Women in the Nation's Defense

The role of women in the military was highlighted in an exhibit at the Cannon Building in Washington, D.C. from 17–28 March. Sponsored by the Department of Defense and organized by the Navy Art Foundation, the exhibit included over 80 works from the service art collections. Particularly noteworthy were a significant number of pieces from the Navy Art Collection, maintained by the

Naval Historical Center. From WW II WAVES (Women Accepted for Voluntary Emergency Service) working in the control tower and as ground crew to today's female pilots, Navy women have had a long history of working side by side with their male counterparts in aviation.
