

Awards

Sgt. Maj. William Skiles from HMLA-267 received the Bronze Star Medal with combat distinguishing device for his actions on 26 April 2004 while on the outskirts of Fallujah, Iraq during Operation Iraqi Freedom. When Sgt. Skiles realized the critical requirement to relieve the platoon of their wounded Marines, he drove the evacuation vehicles and personnel directly to the embattled platoon's position under enemy small-arms fire. After reaching the platoon, he coordinated the evacuation of the wounded Marines, personally laying down suppressive fire and handing out magazines and fragmentation grenades to riflemen low

on ammunition. He then drove through enemy fire to his battalion's forward operating base to console his wounded Marines at the field hospital.

Commander, Naval Air Force Reserve received the **Naval Aviation Readiness Through Safety Award** and the Order of the Daedalians' **Adm. James S. Russell Aviation Flight Safety Award** for 2005. The command, which is responsible for 31 fixed- and rotary-wing squadrons, conducted more than 99,000 flight hours with no Class A mishaps.

HC-85 received the 2005 **DON Safety Excellence Award**.

Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71) returned to her homeport at NS Norfolk, Va., on 11 March after a six-month deployment to the Arabian Gulf in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Dets from VAQ-141, VFA-87, and VFA-15 remained in the 5th Fleet area of responsibility, and rejoined the carrier and its air wing later that month.

SAILOR RECOGNIZED FOR SUPERIOR PERFORMANCE

AZAN Kurtis D. Gaunce assigned to **HS-14** was awarded a Navy Achievement Medal and also received a *Kitty Hawk* (CV 63) commemorative coin for superior performance while servicing a SH-60F helicopter aboard *Kitty Hawk*.



AZAN Guance noticed the aircraft oil he intended to put into the helicopter was discolored and he informed his supervisor. Testing later revealed that the oil was incompatible with the helicopter and would have damaged the aircraft's systems. His efforts prevented countless maintenance hours and funding that would have been needed to repair the helicopter had the faulty oil been used.

Commander, Naval Surface Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, recognized *Kearsarge* (LHD 3) as the number one amphibious warship in the Atlantic Fleet for microminiature (2M) repair cost avoidance. The 2M shop, which repairs high priced subcomponents with less expensive replacement parts, realized \$403,177 in repair cost avoidance for FY05.

HS-3 relieved HS-7, supporting British coalition troops in southeastern Iraq as part of Blue Shark mission, on 28 January. HS-3, embarked aboard Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71), arrived in the region to support maritime security operations and Operation Iraqi Freedom. VS-24, also embarked on Theodore Roosevelt, also conducted intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance missions in support of the operation, flying the S-3B Viking. Blue Shark began approximately two years ago with HS-5 patrolling waterways and oil pipelines. When HS-3 assumed the mission, it was expanded to patrolling and assisting the British soldiers with their peacekeeping missions in the area of Iraq known as Multinational Division Southeast, which covers southeastern Iraq and the inland waterways. This area includes oil pipelines, two oil platforms, Al Basra

Oil Terminal, and Khawr Al Oil Terminal. HS-3 augments Joint Helicopter Force, which is comprised of the British army, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, Royal Marines, and the Danish army.

On 22 February F/A-18E Super Hornets of **VFA-115** became the first aircraft from *Ronald Reagan* (CVN 76) to drop ordnance on enemy targets in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. *Ronald Reagan* is on her maiden deployment, supporting Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom, performing maritime security operations in the Arabian Gulf, and participating in the global war on terrorism.

Rescues

On 4 February crewmembers from **VP-47** assisted in search and rescue operations for survivors of the sunken Egyptian ferry *Al Salam Boccaccio 98* in the Red Sea. The ferry, carrying an estimated 1,400 passengers, sank about 50 miles off the coast of Egypt on 3 February at approximately 0200. The VP-47 crew flew 1,000 miles to assist Egyptian authorities in the search efforts,

providing seven and a half hours of time on station, looking for survivors using the P-3 Orion's infrared capabilities, and guiding ships to survivors throughout the night and into the morning.

On 18 December 2005 the crew of an **HS-3** Seahawk, assigned to CVW-8 on board *Theodore Roosevelt* (CVN 71), rescued one of the carrier's sailors who had fallen overboard during operations in the Arabian Gulf. The helicopter crew returned the sailor to the carrier, where medical personnel determined he was in good condition.

On 2 December 2005 the crew of a Coast Guard **HH-60 Jayhawk** from CGAS Elizabeth City, N.C., rescued three people after their boat capsized in the mouth of the Little River in Albemarle Sound, N.C.

On 19 January the crew of an SH-60B Seahawk from **HSL-49**, operating from *Ford* (FFG 54), rescued two civilian sailors at sea in the early morning hours in the Gulf of Tehuantepec, off the west coast of Mexico. The

Coast Guard notified *Ford*, which was on routine patrol. Once in the vicinity of the distressed ship, a rescue swimmer retrieved the victims, who were returned to *Ford* for evaluation.

On 9 January pilots and aircrew from **HS-4**, embarked on *Ronald Reagan* (CVN 76), helped rescue a civilian mariner suffering from a medical emergency. The 85-foot fishing vessel *Princess Jasmine*, approximately 815 nautical miles northeast of Oahu, Hawaii, issued a distress call for a crewmember who was suffering chest

pains. *Rainier* (T-AOE 7) responded to the vicinity and used a small boat to transport the victim to her onboard medical facility. *Ronald Reagan* dispatched two HH-60H helicopters from HS-4 to transport the patient from *Rainier* to the carrier for treatment.

Outreach

While making a port visit in Singapore 7–11 February, more than 150 sailors from *Ronald Reagan* (CVN 76) participated in community projects to benefit local residents. The sailors helped clean a horse stable that provides riding lessons for disabled children, assisted with gardening and maintenance at a residential care center for AIDS patients, and collected money to donate to a local children's charity.

Seven sailors from **HS-5** meet once a week with high schoolaged children whom they mentor through the Take Stock in Children Program. The sailors provide a comprehensive

curriculum that helps low-income children succeed by providing college scholarships, volunteer mentors, and community support.

VFA-37 formalized the Partnership in Education commitment with Seatack Elementary School, Virginia Beach, Va., in January. The squadron members will work with three fifth grade classes to tutor, serve as lunch buddies, and help at PTA meetings.

Sailors from *Ronald Reagan* (CVN 76), CSG-7, VFA-22, VFA-25, VFA-25, VFA-113, VFA-115 and VAQ-139 participated in a community relations project 24 January, during a five-day port visit to Brisbane, Australia. The project focused on HMAS *Diamantina* (K 377), a WW II frigate that had been restored for display at the Queensland Maritime Museum. The sailors removed debris, hoisted fixtures from below decks, and cleaned most spaces aboard the ship.

SAILORS, MARINES BRING HUMANITARIAN AID TO PHILIPPINES

In response to a devastating landslide that hit the island of Leyte, Philippines, on 17 February, three days before the official commencement of Exercise Balikatan '06, more than 2,000 service members of Joint Task Force Balikatan were diverted to provide humanitarian assistance and disaster relief. Sailors and Marines from Essex (LHD 2) and Harpers Ferry (LHD 49), with embarked Marines of the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit, along with Curtis Wilbur (DDG 54), were directed to provide immediate assistance to Southern Leyte, arriving on 19 February. Juneau (LPD 10), the secondary flagship of the forward deployed amphibious ready group, continued on with Exercise Balikatan's civil military

operations mission in Jolo as the primary sea-based platform.

Philippine and U.S. aircraft flew more than 400 hours, transporting personnel and tons of relief items, such as generators, light sets on tripods, shovels, kettles, blankets, MREs, a reverse-osmosis water purification system, pallets of rice and medication, diesel fuel drums, chain saws, and bottled water.
