CONTESTED LOGISTICS SUSTAINING THE PACIFIC WAR



About the Book

Before World War II, the U.S. Navy relied on an ad hoc system to manage supply and logistical support for deployed ships. The scale and geography of the war in the Pacific forced the Navy to conceptualize how to request, acquire, and distribute the fuel, ammunition, and supplies.

This publication explores the ways in which the Navy struggled to supply the South Pacific during the Guadalcanal campaign and was later unable to adequately plan and track logistics requirements. In response, the Navy adopted a decentralized, inefficient, mass distribution concept of forward logistics, which proved just adequate enough to support late war amphibious campaigns. Post-war, the Navy sought to pass on the lesson that integrated and efficient logistics was the only way forward.

These processes, both in their planned form and actual operation, reveal two significant themes: (1) logistics is line work; and (2) logistics preparations and planning ahead of time are critical for the successful execution of operations, without which the Navy struggled to supply forward-deployed personnel.
